- God addresses this call to the “children of Benjamin”
- Benjamin was one of two tribes which became the Southern Kingdom of Judah when the nation of Israel split into North and South
- To this end we understand God to be addressing, at the least, a subset of the nation of Judah; and also, as we see it here

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
